Purpose	

The One Box is an emergency opioid overdose reversal and rescue kit designed to promote safety by assuring that individuals have access to naloxone, an opioid overdose-reversing drug, in the event that there is an overdose emergency through bystander intervention.

The purpose of this Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) is to provide guidelines for how to maintain your One Box and its contents. It is critical that the responsibilities and procedures outlined below are fulfilled to guarantee the functionality of the One Box.

Scope

The ONE Program, in collaboration with the site, will be responsible for installing the One Box with the Step #1 procedure outlined below. Post-installation, One Box regulatory procedures can be assumed by another staff member of the participating institution.

This procedure applies to personnel who have assumed responsibility for ONE Box maintenance. We recommend that <u>at least one</u> person per location is deemed the point person for fulfilling the responsibilities below to assure that all contents of the ONE Box (naloxone, most importantly) are present in the event of an opioid overdose emergency.



Procedure

- Secure a proper location for the ONE Box. The ONE Box can be installed near other emergency response mechanisms such as first aid kits, automated external defibrillators (AEDs), and/or fire extinguishers. The ONE Box should be installed in a location that is easily visible and meets all requirements of the ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act).
- Monitor regularly. The security tag on the ONE Box should be inspected regularly to
 ensure it is still intact. Your institution will inspect the ONE Box annually to ensure all
 materials are present and not expired.

ONE Box Checklist:

- Naloxone (nasal spray). Two doses should be present.
- CPR kit
- Written instruction naloxone administration
- Fully-charged video
- It is recommended to charge the video within the ONE Box annually to ensure functionality if an emergency arises. The ONE Box is supplied with a charging chord for these purposes.
- Contact your institution if the ONE Box is missing any items or if the naloxone has expired.
- When naloxone is used, scan the QR code on the sticker inside the box to notify your institution that a replacement is needed.
- It is suggested that training is completed at your location annually. To request training sessions on naloxone and safe opioid use, contact Elizabeth.Skoy@ndsu.edu

[Definitions

ONE Box: opioid overdose rescue kit containing: video instructions for naloxone, naloxone administration instruction card, installation hardware, zip ties, narcan nasal spray, CPR facemask, alcohol pad, sterile gloves, instructions for naloxone refill

Naloxone: An opioid reversal drug. Naloxone is an antidote that removes the opioid drug from the site in the brain where the opioid needs to attach in order to work.

Opioid: A class of drugs that work to relieve pain and can be harmful or deadly if misused. Opioids include prescription drugs (morphine, hydrocodone, fentanyl, meperidine) and non-prescription drugs (fentanyl, heroin, etc).

Opioid Overdose: This occurs when an individual consumes more of an opioid drug than their body can handle.

QR Code: A code that can be scanned via smartphone and will lead to a website.

OPIOIDS

- medications primarily used to provide pain relief
- can lead to addiction and/or death even if taken properly
- can be laced into other substances or made to look like candy

NALOXONE (NARCAN)

- medication used to reverse an opioid overdose
- WILL NOT HARM if given to someone who is not experiencing an overdose
- administered nasally



SIGNS OF AN OPIOID OVERDOSE

- Unconscious or unable to wake up
- Breathing slows or stops
- Choking or gurgling noises
- Body goes limp
- · Pale face
- Purple/blue fingernails and lips

OVERDOSE ACTION STEPS

- 1. Call 911
- Administer Naloxone if available
- Move person into recovery position
- 4. Stay with person until help arrives
 - You are protected under the Good Samaritan law for reporting an emergency regardless of intoxication
